An update on the number of facilities that have signed up to SAVE LIVES: Clean Your Hands

The numbers are up again! Since our last update on 5 May 2015, 163 more health-care facilities have registered commitment to the [campaign](#). There are now a total of 17 942 facilities which have signed up, with a facility in another new country coming on board in the last weeks – Gabon. Thank you again for everyone’s commitment.

Facilities signing up to the campaign is one way that the global profile of hand hygiene

action in health care can be maintained. Any health-care facility can sign up to the campaign at any time of the year.
